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In spite of the pandemic and its ensuing upheaval in our personal lives and around the world, MAFA not only continued in its mission of support for the Holy Mountain in 2021, but also began extending its range of activities and its outreach.

Letter of Blessing from His Eminence, Archbishop Elpidophoros,

We began the new year celebrating the blessing of Archbishop Elpidophoros, with whom members of the MAFA board met at his offices in New York City on December 7th. The Archbishop, expressing his enthusiasm for MAFA and its mission, looks forward to supporting those efforts in the future. Financial Report for 2021

MAFA Treasurer Roger McHaney reports that,

*Considering the unusual year with the pandemic impacting those living on the Holy Mountain, as well people across the globe, MAFA enjoyed a year of record giving. Cash donations totaled \$39,984 and a stock gift valued at \$22,251.20 was provided by a generous donor. \$14,327.88 was provided to grant recipients which included the Axion Estin Appeal, Grigoriou Monastery, and the Prodromos Convent in Anatoli, Agia, Greece. * Plans for continued support of healthcare on the Holy Mountain are in place with donors providing over \$10,000 for emergency care. The year concluded with a cash balance of \$40,914.19 and stock valued at \$22,251.20 which will form the basis for additional future grants. Among the 2021 donations designated by their donors for specific MAFA funds or appeals are: The Mount Athos Emergency Fund (\$10,465), the Grigoriou Appeal (\$400), and the Prodromos Convent (\$575). MAFA's operating expenses for the year were \$4,244.68. Since the organization completely relies on volunteer labor, expenses primarily relate to website maintenance, insurance, banking fees, and advertising. In other developments, the MAFA Board opened a brokerage account which enables gifts of stock and other assets to be accepted.*

That is a great success story for MAFA. The grant total year-end balance of \$63,165.39 more than triples the balance at the end of 2020 (\$19,502.75)! We are thankful to all who have made this happen, especially in a year plagued by a pandemic!

The stock transfer mentioned in our treasurer's report is a kick-off contribution to MAFA's **Architectural and Ecological Conservation Fund** from John Campbell, who has consented to our sharing his name. Here are some excerpts from his correspondence with us that we hope may inspire all our readers:

John initially sent us a very simple email note:

I would like to make a donation of \$20,000 to MAFA for the purpose of the "study, preservation and restoration of the historic buildings."

When we suggested our **Architectural and Ecological Conservation Fund** he wrote back,

I am a great fan of trusts and endowments. Many years ago I placed a tiny equity into a trust for my children's future education. In the end, notwithstanding various diversions and disasters, that sent two girls

thru college, gave each a down payment on a house and set a precedent for future generations that continues today.... [after selecting this fund, John added the following, referring to the fund description –] I would only add to "the study, maintenance and repair of the historic buildings and paths." In my memory of a very different Mount Athos, it was on the paths that some of my most memorable sights and conversations occurred. My gift is but a tiny drop in the bucket compared to the European Community funds that I see have been spent in recent years.

We look forward to seeing this kickoff gift grow and contribute to many worthy works on the Holy Mountain. And, ecological conservation does, indeed, include the footpaths, which we continue to support through the Friends of Mount Athos and most recently through our grant to Simonopetra Monastery for a planning project to create improvements and conservation of its footpaths aimed at enhancing the pilgrimage experience with inspiring rest stops for pilgrims.

Thank you, John, for that thoughtful and generous start for our Architectural and Ecological Conservation Fund. Our goal for MAFA is to enable Americans to match the generosity of our European counterparts in support of the Holy Mountain!

Ἀθανάσιος ὁ Ἀθωνίτης, κτίτωρ μονῆς Μεγίστης Λαύρας († 1001/4)

Ἦ γέννησι τοῦ ἱδρυτοῦ τοῦ ἀθωνικοῦ κοινοβιακοῦ μονασιῶν ὁσίου Ἀθανασίου τοῦ Ἀθωνίτη τοποθετεῖται τὴν περίοδο μετὰ τῶν ἐτῶν 925 καὶ 930. Τόπος καταγωγῆς τοῦ ὄντιζε ἢ Τραπεζούντα τοῦ Πόντου καὶ τὸ βασιτικὸν τοῦ ὄνομα ἦταν Ἀβραάμος. Ὁ πατέρας του, μὲ οἰκογενειακὴ καταγωγὴ ἀπὸ τὴν Ἀντιόχεια τῆς Συρίας, πέθανε πρὸ τοῦ ὅ γίενος τοῦ Ἰλλίδι στὴ ζωὴ. Ἀλλὰ καὶ ἡ μητέρα του, μὲ οἰκογενειακὴ καταγωγὴ ἀπὸ τὴν Καρχηδῶνα τοῦ Πόντου, δὲν ἔζησε παρὰ λίγο μόνο μετὰ ἀφότου ὀλοκλήρωσις τὸ ἱδρυτικὸν τοῦ γιου της. Τὴν ἀνατροφή του ὄργανο τοῦ παιδοῦ ἀνέλαβε ἡ γυναίκα κάποιου συγγενεὸς καὶ συντροφίης τῆς μητέρας του, ὁ ὁποῖος λεγόταν Κανίτης καὶ σηκαταλεγόταν μετὰ τῶν ἐπιφανῶν μελῶν τῆς κοινοβιακῆς τῆς Τραπεζούντας. Σὺμφωνα μὲ τὸν δεύτερον βιογράφο τοῦ Ὁσίου, ἡ γυναίκα αὐτὴ ἦταν μοναχὴ ἡ ὁποία νοουθετοῦσε τὸ παιδί νὰ ζῆ μὲ σωφροσύνη καὶ ἔγκρατια.

Ἡ ἀρετὴ τοῦ Ἀβραάμου ἦταν φανερὴ ἰδίαι ἀπὸ τὰ παιδικὰ τὸ χρόνια, τὸ ἴδιο καὶ ἡ ἀγάπη του πρὸς τὰ γράμματα. Ἀφοῦ μαθήτευσεν ὁ κάποιος τοπικὸν γραμματικῶν, μετῆν ἐστὴν Κωνσταντινουπόλει γὰρ ἑνὸς ἑτέρου σπουδῆς τοῦ καὶ τὸ ἀποκαλεστοῦν Πατριάρχου Ἀ΄ Ἀυγουστίνου (920-944). Ἀφορμὴ ἐπέθεσε κάποιος κομμεραρίας, δηλαδὴ εἰσπραξιῶν φόρων, ποὺ ὅταν πέρασε ἀπὸ τὴν Τραπεζούντα, προσέξτε τὸ ἦθος τοῦ νεαροῦ Ἀβραάμου καὶ τοῦ ζήτησε νὰ τὸν ἀκολουθήσει ἐπὶ βιζαντινὴν πρωτεύουσα. As announced in *Newsletter 4*, MAFA has joined with the Mount Athos Center (Agioreitiki Estia) to publish an English translation of the Mount Athos Center’s spectacular 415-page volume, *Hagiorite Panagion. The Chorus of the Saints on Athos*, under the editorship of the respected and internationally recognized scholar, Symeon A. Paschalidis (<https://www.agioritikiestia.gr/en/hagioreitikon-panagion-ton-en-atho-ho-choros>). The above image (from the original Greek version, pages 52-53) shows the beginning of the life of Athanasios the Athonite, founder of the Great Lavra Monastery († 1001/4), illustrated by the icon of Athanasios from the wall of the Protaton church attributed to the painter, Manuel Panselinos.

The translation is proceeding beautifully; we have had a chance to read some of the first translations of the lives of the Athonite saints by Andrew Philip Hendry, and they are beautifully written. This is a 3-year project, and we look forward enthusiastically to its completion in 2023/24.

MAFA SCHOLARSHIPS

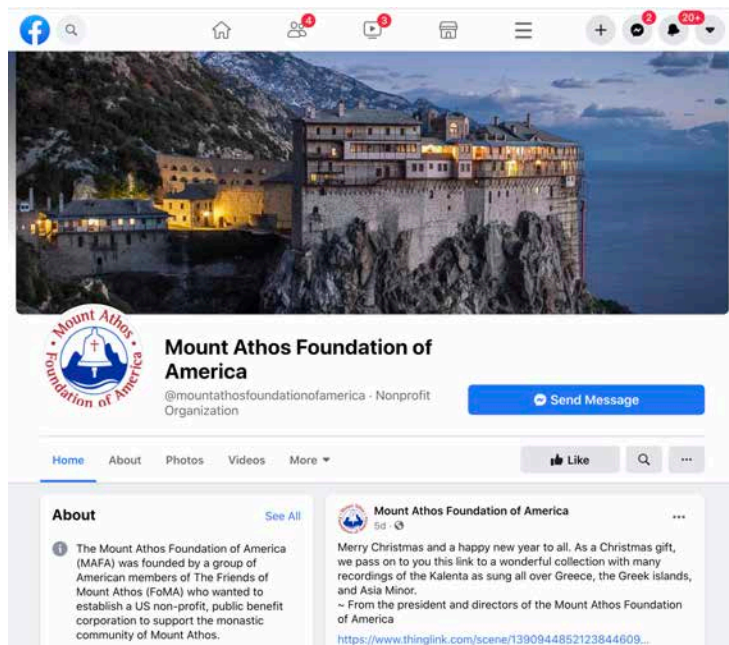
MAFA is pleased to announce its 2021 scholarship: to Professor Kostis Smyrlis (Ph.D., the Sorbonne), a researcher for the National Hellenic Research Foundation in Athens (<http://www.eie.gr/>) and the Centre Nationale de la Recherche Scientifique in Paris (<http://www.cnrs.fr/>). We are especially appreciative of our partnership with **The Mount Athos Center in Thessaloniki**, which provides invaluable support for our scholarship winners, assuring the best chance for success of their projects.

Prof. Smyrlis is the head of a four-person team of scholars working on the edition of the archival documents of the Holy Monastery of Zographou as part of the *Archives de l'Athos* series. Each volume in this series includes an extensive introduction dealing with the history of a monastery and the topography of its territorial holdings during the medieval period. The team directed by Prof. Smyrlis is conducting a survey of the areas where the Zographou Monastery held landed property, namely the Athonite peninsula, various locations in Halkidiki, and the Strymon River Valley, comparing today's topographical and archeological data to the information found in the archival documents, and identifying the location of the estates, where possible. Our MAFA scholarship is funding travel and related expenses for this survey.

The publication of the medieval archival documents of the monasteries of Mount Athos in the *Archives de l'Athos* series, that began in the 1930s in Paris and continues to this day, has contributed enormously to the study of the social, economic, and religious history of the Byzantine Empire. More particularly, the accompanying studies on the landed holdings of the monasteries have been of particular importance for understanding the historical geography of the Holy Mountain and its broader area, and for studying the history of the landscape and the environment, as well as human settlement, demography and toponyms. The holdings of the monastery of Zographou, the subject of this project, are of particular importance, since they extend in areas not too well covered by previous volumes on other monasteries, for example the estuary of the Strymon river.

We wish Prof. Smyrlis every success and are honored to be able to support him in this important project.
